Chaplains Message

THREE NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS FOR 2009

Traditionally New Year's is the time for resolutions. Why? Because last year, although there were indeed good deeds and good moments, there were some less than glorious aspects in our moral and human lives. Instinctively, we know that we should be better—some bad habits so hard to break or even in the way we treated certain people. Nonetheless, last year's good intentions that never seemed to have gotten off the ground—things like these that need our attention, need our determination to improve and try again.

Whatever your conscience tells you about New Year's resolutions, I would like to suggest three. I hope these won't seem too abstract or lofty, but will give us food for thought as we stand on the threshold of 2009. Let me begin by sharing a story:

Edward Bok, one time editor of the Ladies' Home Journal, came to America as a child, from Denmark. Many years before as he tells the story, his grandfather had been commissioned by the King of Denmark to lead a band of soldiers against pirates who were playing havoc with shipping along a certain coastal area.

The elder Bok set up his headquarters on a rocky, desolate island just off the coast, and after a few years was able to clear the pirates out. Upon returning to the mainland, Bok reported back to the King. The King was very pleased with his efforts, and offered Bok anything he wanted. Bok told the King that all he wanted was a plot of land on the island where he had just lived and fought for so many months. The island was barren, and the King wondered why would he want to live there? I want to plant trees, said Bok. I want to make the island beautiful.

The King's aides thought he was absolutely crazy. The island was constantly swept by storms and high winds; he would never be able to grow trees there. Bok, however, insisted, and the King granted him his wish. Bok went to live on the island, built a home, and was eventually able to bring his wife there to live. For years they worked persistently, planting trees, shrubs, and grass. Gradually the vegetation took hold and the island began to flourish. One morning the couple arose to hear birds singing. There had never been any birds on the island before. Eventually the island became a showplace, and is now visited by thousands of tourists each year. When he died, the grandfather requested that the following words be inscribed on his tombstone: "Make the world a bit more beautiful and better because you have been in it."

But the story doesn't end here. Edward Bok, the grandson, believed that anyone who was able to do so should retire at the age of fifty and spend the rest of his or her life making the world a more beautiful and better place to live. And he was as good as his word. He retired at fifty and bought Iron Mountain, the highest point today in Florida at an elevation of 324 feet above sea level. There, he set out to repeat what his grandfather had done.

Edward Bok was more than successful. Iron Mountain is now called Mountain Lake Sanctuary, Florida. Upon his death, Edward Bok willed the land to the State of Florida, and it's now a major tourist attraction. On the younger Bok's grave is the same inscription as is on his grandfather's: "Make the world a bit more beautiful and better because you have been in it."

- 1) First Resolution - to make the world a better more beautiful place because we have been in it. Does this inscription sound too grand to be a resolution? I don't think so. There many ways to make the world a more beautiful and better place: plant a tree, bring flowers to the nursing home, spend time with a teenager, read a story to a child, clean up the neighborhood, send cards to the sick. Take something that is rough or unfinished or ugly and make it beautiful.

2) Second Resolution - is to pick up on what others have started. Most of us have known losses. We have lost spouses or children, relationships or health. However we may name our losses, they are out there scattered all over the landscape. But we can choose what to do about these losses. We can either turn in on ourselves and forever cry "woe is me"; or we can pick up on those who turn tragedy into discipleship.

Build on the good works of people you know, but also of people you don't know. Instead of getting angry, get more involved with some Knights of Columbus activity that will make the world a better place. Perhaps you can make it your resolve to sign up 5 new members to the Knights of Columbus for 2009. Do something to make parish life better for everyone. There are homeless people to house, there are hungry people to feed, and lonely people to visit. There are challenges right in your own parish that need attention.

This is a good resolution, isn't it? Pick up on what others have done. Continue the love and spirit of good and decent people, which will turn the world around.

3) Third Resolution - show someone what God is like. A man relates that when he was a little boy, he was forever coming home late from school, which meant he was late for dinner every day. His father finally got fed up and said, "Look, next time you come late for dinner, you will get bread and water. That's it!" Sure enough, the next day the boy came home late from school. He walked into the house and there were his mother and father, with plates with meat and potatoes and vegetables set in front of them. In front of his place, however, were a plate of bread and a glass of water. The boy was crushed. His father waited for the full weight of the lesson to sink in, then silently took his own full plate and put it in front of his son. He took his son's empty plate and put it in front of himself. And now a man he went on to say: "All my life I have known what God is like by what my father did that night." It's as simple as that.

People learn about God not because they figure out the Trinity, not because they tune into what the Vatican is doing, not because they are great theologians. People learn about God from Godlike people. Even people who have done some evil, even people who have messy corners in their lives; you can still share a full plate with someone who has nothing, so to speak. You can be God to someone who will remember what God is like because they remember what you are like.

So there you have it three suggestions for New Year's resolutions. First, make the world a bit more beautiful, better because you have been in it. Secondly, pick up what others have started—you can make a difference. Thirdly, show somebody this year what God is like, without letting them know what you're doing.

If we just strive to keep these three resolutions, 2009 will be a very happy new year indeed.

Greetings to one and all from the Heart of North Carolina!

I truly hope that you are having a great start to the New Year!

As I sat in Mass this past Sunday as we celebrated the Holy Family, the homily presented was quite striking and I would like to share a synopsis with you. A part of the homily went something like this:

There is much crisis in our lives. Imagine all of the challenges that we meet every day. Now let's take a look at the crises that were faced by the Holy Family. Think of Mary, a young, unmarried teenage girl who found herself pregnant at a very early age – CRISIS. I am sure she had many questions, doubts and fears. But she knows in her heart that this is all the work of God, so she puts her trust and faith in the Lord. Think of Joseph, a respected member of his community, betrothed to Mary, finds out that this young girl is already pregnant – CRISIS. He makes plans to break off their marriage and let Mary deal with her situation by herself. When an angel of the Lord visits him, Joseph puts his trust and faith in the Lord and proceeds with his marriage to Mary. When the couple traveled to Bethlehem in order to be counted in the census there is no room for the couple anywhere, Mary is very near to giving birth, but they have no where to stay – CRISIS. God leads them to a manger, they sleep with the animals and Mary gives birth to Jesus in what would be considered a very dirty and inadequate setting – CRISIS. When the time came for Jesus to be presented at the temple, the tradition at the time was to offer the child as a sacrifice, but one could buy their way out of the sacrifice by offering a lamb. This couple had little material belongings and had to offer two turtledoves in place of the lamb – CRISIS. Then later they find out that Herod is searching for Jesus in order to kill him – CRISIS. The family escapes to Egypt. After hearing of Herod's death, they return to their beloved Jerusalem, but Joseph has no job in order to provide for his young family – CRISIS. Each time the Holy Family faced a CRISIS, they put their trust and faith in God and God provided.

I am sure that this synopsis does not do justice to the words spoken this past Sunday and for that I apologize. But the message is clear. When the Joseph and Mary had doubts, had fears, were plagued with anxiety, they put their trust and faith in God. As we go about our daily lives and face the many crises that are presented, we truly need to put our trust and faith in God, as He will provide for us.

I hope as we embark on this new year with so many opportunities, and crises, we rely on God to show us the way. May you all have a truly blessed new year and I look forward to seeing you during the two mid-year meetings.

I would like to call particular attention to 2 very important items in the Reporting Process:


#1 - On page 9 can be found the heading: Recognizing Councils Overall Service Programs. This is the form that you, the GK, and the DD prepare based on your programs from October 1, 2008 – March 31, 2009. You must submit this form to be considered for any of the Charity, Unity and Fraternity Awards and any further State Awards.

#2 – On page 10 can be found the heading: Recognizing the Best Service Programs. This is where you as GK, DGK and your Program Chairman get together and submit the best activity in each of the six (6) Program Areas of Church, Community, Council, Family, Youth and Membership. Only one activity may be submitted per program area for consideration. All requests must be submitted on the State Council Service Program Awards Form found on pg. 23 in the Council Report Forms Booklet (brown cover) and also found on the website under Programs.

Your requests for recognition are very important to your State Officers and that is why it is imperative that your requests are received by us in a timely fashion. If they are sent after the due date and the judging has already been accomplished, we cannot change our decisions.

Brothers, we must look on the bright side – the award process is to recognize Councils and our Brother Knights for their outstanding efforts in the program areas. What better way to acknowledge your accomplishments than to return to your Council with an award in hand!!

We look forward to the next couple of months, as it is a busy time of the year for us all, however please take the time to recognize your Brothers for the great works that have been accomplished!

GOLDEN KNIGHT OF THE YEAR GUIDELINES

Each council is encouraged to submit ONE (1) candidate for this prestigious award.

A candidate for this award must be a member in good standing and must have been a member of the Order for a minimum of 15 years. The brother Knight so honored should exemplify Columbianism in the truest sense of the word. He should be a true source of inspiration to his brother Knights. Since one deserving the title of “Golden Knight” should be a man involved in the works of the Order, his Church, and his Community, his resume should include his involvement and accomplishments in all of these areas.

Every council that has a distinguished Knight in their ranks who qualifies, is strongly encouraged to honor him by naming him their local Golden Knight, and then submit his resume for the state wide competition.

Previous winners of this award, or winners of the State Knight of the Year award, prior to 1974, (the year this award was initiated), are **NOT** eligible for consideration.

Judges will be concerned with FACTUAL information describing the candidate’s accomplishments since he joined the Order. The quality of literary embellishments will not influence the decision. The winning candidate will be announced at the State Convention and his resume will be read. Please be concise and limit the resume to two (2) typewritten pages, double spaced. The winning entry will be included in the minutes of the convention, so please use council letterhead for the first page and good quality, white paper for the second. To increase dramatic impact, try to name your candidate only in the last paragraph of the resume.

The candidate’s resume must be sent to the State Secretary **NO LATER THAN APRIL 1st** to be considered. No exceptions. Any questions regarding this award should be addressed to the State Deputy.
